CBG Hershey Children's Garden Planter

L ach year the Cleveland Botanical Garden (CBG) affiliate garden clubs are asked to plant one of the containers in the CBG Hershey Children's Garden. This year our club was asked to incorporate a fairy/gnome house in our container. Our Affiliate Representative Kathy Smith created a gnome house out of a terracotta pot. She stained the pot (to add some age), covered it with stones, added moss (gathered from her yard), as well as Lake Erie driftwood, and finished it off with the gnome door and 'succulent'themed pots at the entrance.

Kathy planted both pots with a variety of hardy and tender succulents. A gravel path leads to the door lined by Sempervivums. This container sits right by the tree house, in an area that gets some shade in the afternoon but should do very well throughout the summer.

Ever wonder why the website for the club is MWCSS? Midwest Cactus & Succulent Society is definitely four words long (we don't count the *and*) yet the acronym is five letters. *Midwest* certainly is a single word but is represented by two letters. It must be an important part of the name.

Names are important and they can tell you a lot. If you ever heard Bill and I ar-

gue over plant names, it is because the names say a great deal about the plant. Even the word *argue* is important. *Argue* does not have to mean a knock-down, drag-out fight. *Argue* can mean to give evidence to support a point of view—no yelling, no name-calling. Academic argument is a civil exchange of evidence or ideas such as if gasoline taxes should be raised, or if there is actually any taste to light beer, or if the *Latin* names of plants need to be changed.

Latin binomials are very important to how we organize every living thing on this planet (and I suspect beyond in the coming century). They consist of the **genus** name first then the **specific epithet** second. When used together they are unique to that plant and they tell how it is related to every other plant; the name may also give a partial description of that plant. For instance, Ferrocactus means fierce cactus, a pretty good description; Gymnocalycium means naked flower bud, describing the smooth, hairless buds.

Common names can be used and distributed to the point where they are useless when talking about plants. If I have a plant I cannot identify, I can call it "Bob" and sell it to someone who will forevermore call it Bob. But when they want to talk to someone else about it, Bob means nothing; they can't communicate. If I call every cactus that looks like a *Gymnocalycium* a Chin Cactus then how will I ever know it is not a *Notocactus*? With the Latin name, you know that there can be only one *Mammillaria spinosissima*, and when you talk to someone else about it, you are both talking about the same plant.

Make it a point to keep track of the Latin names of your plants or identify them to the best of your ability. You can even learn to speak a bit of Latin. With a few exceptions, every letter is pronounced. So, a word like knight would be "k-ni-git." There are about 20 sounds you have to get used to using. Scientific Latin does differ a bit from classical Latin, so they are not exactly the same; some changes make it easier to read and speak. A few sounds include: "ch" is pronounced as "k"; "x" at the beginning of a word is pronounce as "z"; a final "e" or "es" is long like "see" or "sees"; a final "a" is short like "ah." Speak slowly, say every letter and you will get pretty close to correct. Pretty soon, *Maihueniopsis clavarioides* will be rolling off your tongue at the next Christmas party.

And why MWCSS? Well, typing "midwestcactusandsucculentsociety" is just too long and MCSS was, at that point, taken by the Midwest Cigar Smokers Society. No kidding.

CBG is in the University Circle/Wade Park area of Cleveland, five miles east of downtown.

From I-90 Lakeshore Memorial Freeway: Exit at Martin Luther King Drive and go south on MLK.

Cross E. 105th and take right curve. Turn left on Jeptha (at art museum) to Wade Oval.

CBG is across the park and at the end of East Blvd.
